

This is to advise that the Howard County Health Department recommends issuance of the demolition permit for the above referenced property. The existing well and septic trench may possibly be utilized for the replacement house. Mr. Riely has agreed to the following conditions set forth by the Health Department:

Before demolition, the well and septic system that served the current house must be properly disconnected and sealed off. Also, protective devices placed around them to prevent any damage. These precautions should remain in place during the demolition and construction phases. The well (HO-73-0156) can be reconnected to the new house.

Because of its age, the septic system condition and size will have to be evaluated by our Development Coordination Section and possibly a 10,000 Sq. Ft. septic reserve area be established before a building permit is approved.

A new septic permit covering proper sizing of the system, possible new tank installation, hook up to the existing trenches and house connection will need to be obtained. A well inspection will be required for final approval when reconnecting to the new house. Additionally, applicable water tests for issuance of an ICOP will be needed.

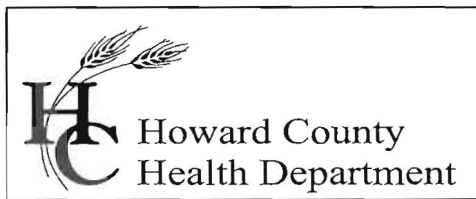



The following are observations regarding physical appearance of an existing well (tag# HO-73-0156) on the subject property: a 6-inch diameter iron (or steel) casing extends 15" a grassy earth surface; metal cap fastened tightly; a nylon rope emerging from under cap is tied snugly around casing near ground surface, and a galvanized metal conduit containing the electric power wire extends into the soil from the cap.
